IMPORTANT FRIENDS ITEMS FOR MEMBERSHIP VOTE

At the annual meeting, there will be two important items to be voted on by members. **First**, there are changes to the Bylaws being proposed by the Board. They are:

ARTICLE V: BOARD OF DIRECTORS AND OFFICERS

Proposed new wording for the Bylaws with changes underlined

1. Candidates for the Board of Directors shall be members in good standing of the Corporation. The Board shall consist of the officers, the immediate past President, and at least 3 additional Directors but no more than 15. The President-Elect and the President shall be elected for one year. The President-Elect shall assume the President position the following year. The Past President shall also serve for one year. Other officers and Directors shall be elected for two years but

- may be re-elected. To avoid a complete turnover of the Board, the Board may stagger the terms. Designated representative of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service may serve as liaison to the Corporation and its Board as nonvoting members of the Board.
- 6. The Officers of the Corporation shall consist of a President, a <u>President-Elect</u> (previously called the Vice President), a Secretary, a Treasurer, and such other officers as the Board of Directors may deem necessary. The same person may hold any two or more offices, except that the President and Secretary may not hold additional offices.

Next, the new officers and directors for 2013 will be presented for you consideration. The nominating committee of Jay Bushnell, Bob Hudson, Roger McDaniels and Greg Lang are presenting the following slate for 2013: Jay Bushnell for President, Bob Hudson for President elect, Richard Herman for Treasurer, Ed DeHaan again for Director and Jan Conners, Greg Lang and Roger McDaniels as new directors.

It is important to note that nominations from the floor will also be encouraged of people willing to participate.

BOARD CHARTS AMBITIOUS AGENDA FOR 2013

Working with Refuge Manager Gude and staff, the Friends Board of Directors has identified 12 priority initiatives for 2013. These have been used to develop budgets and guide expenditures of effort. Some initiatives center on improving refuge facilities, including enhancements to the River Trail and the Shell Mound interpretive program. Several others seek to build community support for the refuges and their conservation mission, with a major emphasis on Dixie County and the Cedar Key backwater marshes. An art initiative, redoubled efforts on last years' successful paddling initiative, and an education initiative are intended to increase the visibility of the refuges and their mission. Two science initiatives will help to facilitate citizen involvement in providing the science needed for sound management of the refuges' natural resources. Leaders for each effort are being

identified, and contact information will be provided to members when more detailed plans have been developed. by Russ Hall

HIDDEN COAST PADDLE FESTIVAL

The Friends' paddle initiative kicked off at the 3rd Annual Hidden Coast Paddling Festival, staged in the town of Suwannee on October 5-7. The event successfully showcased the Lower Suwannee National Wildlife Refuge; and at the same time, indirectly, gave direction to our paddling initiative. Approximately 75 paddlers from around the state enjoyed a low country boil Friday night, Friends sponsored breakfast Saturday morning and three days of workshops, activities, events and guided paddling on seven of the designated trails in our refuge. The consensus of paddlers attending was "outstanding paddling!" and "can't wait till next year in Cedar Key."

The Refuge staff was led by Manager, Andrew Gude, Ranger, Pam Darty, Deputy Manager Larry Woodward, Officer, Kenny McCain & Christina Diaz. They contributed many hours to help make the festival a success. Starting with Friday evening cooking to seminars, safety patrol and hosting paddles throughout the weekend, refuge folks were everywhere and did everything they could to enhance the enjoyment of attendees. The Refuge proved to be an enticing stage and the Friends learned a few things to help direct our paddling initiative.

FISHING IN THE REFUGE

Winter is a wonderful time to fish the waters of the Refuge for the whole family. Whether you fish up in the creeks, the waters just outside the creeks, or the islands around Cedar Key, the Redfish, Seatrout and other species such as Black Drum are usually willing to bite. Try fishing a live shrimp, piece of cut mullet or a live mud minnow on an oyster bar on the incoming tide. Chances are, you will find some action. And,



even on those rare days when the fish aren't biting, the scenery and setting are absolutely magnificent. Refuge waters are accessible from boat ramps in the Refuges at Shell Mound, McCormick Creek (small boats only) and the Cedar Key Public Marina. by Grandpa Bob Hudson

REFUGE FORESTRY HIGHLIGHTS

This year has been a very productive and busy year for the Forestry Program here at the Lower Suwannee NWR. Last week we completed a habitat restoration project that started with a proposal in June 2011. The project consisted of planting 44,000 stems of longleaf pine and 60,500 stems of wiregrass plugs on 24 different sites scattered across the Refuge. Sites that were planted coincided with past timber sales with the removal of slash pine (planted by the former timber companies) to create openings to restore

the sites back to its historic longleaf pine. Williams forestry was contracted to plant the sites. A crew of 15 planted all 24 sites (104,500 Longleaf and Wiregrass stems) in 4 days with



constant supervision from Refuge Staff. The wire grass was inner planted with the longleaf pine to create fine fuels for future controlled burns that was lost after the slash pine were removed. The Project proposal was approved in June 2011, funds for the project were secured in September 2011, and seedlings were ordered in March 2012. The sites were mechanically prepped for planting in September and October 2012 and the sites were planted in January 2013.

We currently have scheduled habitat restoration projects for our staff, volunteers, and organized groups. We have purchased 20,250 longleaf pine and 27, 875 wiregrass plugs to be planted on 9 different sites in Levy County this winter and summer. We need help planting these sites. The UF Forestry Club and the UF Wildlife Club have volunteered to plant 15,000 stems on February 9. 2013. The Refuge has planned an all staff work day to plant longleaf and wiregrass on February 4 - 5, 2013 and February 11, 2013. We graciously except any volunteers for these scheduled staff work days. This is fun work and excellent fellowship. This work is fairly easy with several different tasks and we can find a use for just about anybody. We will meet at the Refuge Headquarts around 8:00 am and work till everyone has had enough, usually till about 1:00 or 2:00 pm. All tools will be provided. Boots and long pants are the preferred attire. Please contact Daniel Barrand or Pam Darty if you plan to help

HABITAT RESTORATION

If you've noticed a tinge of wood smoke in the air lately, it's probably because the fire crew at Lower Suwannee has been busy in the past couple weeks burning pine uplands around the refuge. To date, the refuge has burned about 670 acres in the area of the North Entrance to the Nature Drive, and the Salt Creek area in Dixie County. Forestry Tech Anthony DiMaggio has been apprenticing under FMO and Burn Boss Vic Doig's tutelage and is making great strides. The process of becoming a certified burn boss takes years, but based on recent results, Anthony will make a good one.

The refuge conducts prescribed burns in appropriate areas of fire-dependant forests and natural communities to benefit wildlife habitat



for such critters as gopher tortoises, Bachman's sparrows, pine snakes, fox squirrels, Bobwhite quail, and many other species of plants and animals that depend on regular fire to maintain their open herbaceous habitat. by Vic Doig
